INTRODUCTION

During this eternal moment, she, and faraway Ofer, and everything that occurs in the vast space between them, are all deciphered in a flash of knowledge, like a densely woven fabric ... (p.72)

To the End of the Land is the story of a woman attempting to deal with the everyday realities of life in modern-day Israel, a life lived out against the background of wars, occupations, intifadas, and the ever-present spectre of the Israeli army. Ora, a middle-aged Israeli woman, has watched her two boys make it through their mandatory military service without getting harmed. However, when Ora's younger son Ofer volunteers for a major battle — mere weeks after being discharged and days before he and Ora are supposed to go on a mother-son hiking trip in the north of Israel — Ora cannot deal with the pressure of sitting at home and waiting for the possible news of Ofer's death to reach her.

She takes her and Ofer's backpacks and, along with Avram, an old lover, she heads up into the Galilee. Away from the news, without cellphones, virtually severed from the outside world, they hike the country, telling their intertwined stories. Grossman paints a sweeping portrait of a family completely embroiled in the unescapable Israeli reality of the army.



The novel believes in what Grossman calls the "fullness of life" and, at the same time, it honestly represents the violence, complexity and demoralizing effect of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. At its core, *To the End of the Land* is a treatise on the importance of human relationships — in all their messy, emotional truth — in surviving life in a war-torn country, where the existential threat to the life of oneself and one's loved ones is omnipresent. *To the End of the Land* is a love story, a drama, a war story, a family story, a female story, and, perhaps most importantly, a story about the importance of stories.

Keys to the Novel

- To the End of the Land is a big, sweeping novel and an intimate family portrait, while at the same time being a deeply compelling exploration of modern Israel. For readers without detailed knowledge of Israeli politics, geography, or culture, the novel can seem quite daunting. However, at its core the book is also about "the fullness of life." In the beautifully evoked scenes of domestic life, in the stories Ora tells about her children, the novel celebrates what is universally human. A good way into the novel is to let these stories wash over you, remind you of your own childhood/parenthood, and fill you with a new perspective of the "fullness of life."
- The Israel Trail: For most of the novel, Ora and Avram are hiking on the Israel Trail in the Golan Heights and the Galilee. The Israel Trail is a hiking route that traverses Israel in a north-south orientation. It goes from Dan in the very north of Israel to Eilat in the very south, going through forest, mountain, desert, and urban landscapes in its almost 1000-kilometer journey. The pathway is maintained by the Society for the Protection of Nature in Israel and, from end to end, takes about five months to complete. Grossman himself hiked the portion of the trail featured in the novel as research. The hike becomes a way for Ora and Avram to get reacquainted and escape from the news, from history, and from the army. As Ora says to Avram near the novel's end, "We'll have to hike the whole country three times to fit everything in." (p.446)



Author Information

- David Grossman is one of Israel's most prominent authors. Alongside Amos Oz and A.B. Yehoshua, he is now considered part of the old-guard of Israeli literature, and holds an honoured spot in Israeli culture. Grossman, while still a Zionist (meaning he believes in Israel's right to exist and to defend itself), has been vocally critical of Israel's government and its policies, in particular regarding the occupation of the West Bank and the Gaza Strip. For giving voice to these concerns, Grossman is a national hero to many in Israel.
- Grossman was born in 1954 in Jerusalem, and has lived the majority of his life in that city and its environs. Grossman has a B.A. from Hebrew University, and is married to Michal Grossman, who is a psychologist. They have three children, named Yonatan, Ruth, and Uri. (Uri died in 2006; more below).
- Grossman has written many novels, children's books, and non-fiction books. His translated novels include *The Smile of the Lamb* (original 1983, translation 1991); *See Under: Love* (original 1986, translation 1989); *The Book of Intimate Grammar* (original 1992, translation 1994); *Be My Knife* (original 1998, translation 2001); *Someone to Run With* (original 2000, translation 2004); and *Her Body Knows: Two Novellas* (2005).
- Most of Grossman's fiction deals with the effect of historical events (such as the Israeli/Palestinian conflict and the Holocaust) on the individual. He is ever curious about what happens to people in certain dramatic and traumatic situations and wonders how they cope. In an interview in *Publishers Weekly*, Grossman says that: "The subject that captures and fascinates me the most is that clash between the individual and the arbitrariness of outside events, of governments, of the Holocaust, of machines, of the human body. The individual can redeem and redefine himself in front of that arbitrariness. For me, every book has been a part of the answer." (Handelzalts)
